Freedom of Information: Right to know request

Thank you for your email to Clive Corrie; Ed Richards; and Graham Howell which was received on 20 October 2010. You asked the following questions which have been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 ('the Act'). I have answered these questions in full below, as numbered by you.

- 1 Over what distance precisely does OFCOM rule that the transfer Radio Frequency energy between two points, not physically connected by any material substance, ceases to be 'wireless telegraphy' according to OFCOM's interpretation of the law?**

Ofcom does not hold this information as it has not made such a ruling.

- 2 If OFCOM believes there is a short distance where it is not regarded as wireless telegraphy, what is that precise distance and where does OFCOM get its power to make such a legal definition**

Ofcom does not hold this information for the reason set out in the answer to question 1.

- 1 Who is the officer at OFCOM responsible for issuing licenses?**

- 2 What is the appeal procedure on refusal of a licence?**

No other information is available other than what is in the legislation. The legal position on appeals is governed by the Wireless Telegraphy Act 2006 and the Communications Act 2003.

- 3 Again under the FOI Act, I require a formal refusal document and copies of all paperwork relating to appeals.**

There is no paperwork to disclose to you and we will not be creating any further documentation about our decision not to grant a licence in this case.
